Total Eclipse of the Heart of Wayne County

On Monday, April 8 at 3:20 p.m., Wayne County residents will have the privilege of witnessing a magnificent and extremely rare event. Unless you have been living on the moon, which actually will facilitate this event, you must certainly have heard that there will be a total eclipse of the sun on that day. However, you may not yet realize just how rare it is to be in the path of totality of one of these truly historic and heavenly events.

The last time any part of Wayne County was in the narrow band of totality, where the view of the sun is totally obscured by the new moon, it was nearly a century ago on January 24, 1925. As shown here on the front page of the Newark Courier from January 15, 1925, it explained that...

Not every generation is given the opportunity of viewing this wonderful sight. No total eclipse of the sun has been visible in this part of the United States since 1806, and we will have to live until 2024 if we are to see another.

While solar eclipses actually occur somewhere over the Earth about every year and a half, the viewing area under the path of totality which experiences sudden darkness is rarely seen in populated areas because it most often occurs over water, which is 71% of the Earth's surface. The viewing path also ranges in width and




trajectory. These nuances add to the calculated phenomena of this special shadow ONLY passing over the same place no more than once a century.

This year, the moon's shadow, the umbra, will enter the U.S. at the southern border of Texas and traverse the continent toward the northeast in a path that is approximately 108 to 122 miles wide. The umbra will travel at a rate of approximately 1,500 m.p.h.

In 1925, half the county was not in the path of totality. This year all of Wayne County will be. The first contact starts around 2:00 p.m. Full eclipse occurs at approx.

3:20 p.m. with the last contact ending at around

4:30 p.m. In most parts of the County, darkness will last about 3 1/2 minutes. The Poster Art shown above indicates the length of totality for each town in the county. The next 1925 viewing area was south of line. time Wayne County will experience a



total solar eclipse like this won't be until the year 2144. You should plan now where you will watch it this time around. ###

Meet Delaney



There have been lots of changes at the Museum of Wayne County History for 2024 and beyond, and one of them is my role here.

time to help people with the many research questions we receive every month. Those queries aren't limited to just members—they come from people who have read about us online, or in local newspaper articles. Many are curious about ancestors they know who came from Wayne County but haven't been able to trace farther than here.

Sometimes we can find connections using our extensive database of past donations that has been digitally catalogued by our Librarian, Loreen Jorgensen, and our Chief Archivist and current Board President Kathleen Marshall. Each item is catalogued and tagged with at least one surname, but often more, and the year or era, and the area of the county it came from. Items donated by members over the years include old newspapers, letters, and even diaries

WHAT'S NEXT

Following the Eclipse we will focus in on the many "Military Memories" within Wayne County. This special exhibit will highlight the contributions of generations of Wayne County military men and women, and their families. From the French and Indian War to the Revolution, the War of 1812 and the Civil War, to the two World Wars, Korea, Vietnam, Desert Storm as well as recent miliary actions, we will display unique artifacts and tell the stories that feature the people of Wayne County.

We are also currently planning a slight renovation and upgrade of the Military Room on the second floor. As a result, some of the many artifacts in that room will be moved downstairs to the main exhibit room, as well as some that are not currently on display. This will include select firearms, uniforms, badges, photos, war posters, diaries and



other memorabilia that we have. The exhibit is slated to be active from Memorial Day through Pearl Harbor Day.

One special feature of this exhibit will be an introduction to the in-depth research being conducted on the local Wayne County soldiers who made up nearly one-half of the 111th NY Volunteer Regiment of the Civil War. Their stories are just waiting to be told. ###





This blue seltzer bottle, with John E. Forgham etched in the glass, was donated to the museum by Forgham descendant, Margaret Hill.

If you have ever heard Rt. 31 in Lyons also called Forgham St, from Geneva St. and ending at near Leach Rd, this bottle helps explain. The Richard Forgham family residence and Forgham Bottling Works were located on the south side of the street, along with a number of rental houses also owned by the family in the 1880s. In 1965, the houses were torn down to make way for a gas station. Lyons natives still refer to the area as Forgham's Corners.

Thank you to those who donate their artifacts to our collection. You help us tell the story of Wayne County.



Memorial Monuments

Thousands of local men and women have gone off to war to defend and serve our nation. Upon reflection of these

sacrifices, local community's erect memorials and monuments to honor these people. In Lyons, the American Legion was often responsible for war monuments. One spot in Lyons has seen quite a few memorials, and in cooperation with the Town of Lyons, it will soon see another, honoring soldiers going back four or five generations.



The Civil War changed the landscape of our nation like no other war. Thousands of countrymen served and died in those years of fighting. Today, there are no living veterans of this war. (Albert Woolson was the last surviving Civil War veteran and the last from the Union. He died at age 106 in 1956. The last confirmed Confederate Civil War veteran, Pleasant Crump, died in 1951 at age 104.)

In August 1862, there were over 1900 local men and often

teen boys from Wayne and Cayuga Counties who volunteered for a 3-year enlistment as part of the NY 111th Volunteer Infantry Regiment. One Williamson soldier, Issac Mullie, has a living descendant who is now researching the entire regiment. He has asked WCHS and the Town of Lyons to accept a life-size monument in remembrance of these Civil War soldiers.

The new memorial will depict a scene involving men in this regiment on July 2, 1863 at Gettysburg. This monument will be placed in a sacred spot at Lyons central park as a lasting

memorial to all the soldiers of the 111th and their role in saving the union.

The location in the park where this will be placed has been home to many memorial monuments through the years. These photos show the occupants of that honored, hallowed place, at the east end of the park between the fountain and the gazebo.


First, a cannon was place on a pedestal, to honor the heroes of WWI. Next, the Honor Roll of World War II. After the Honor Roll, a modern Matador missile was erected there. Later, the recent, now former, Veterans' obelisk was there but has since been moved to its new home at Taylor Park on the southeast corner of Montezuma and Geneva Streets in Lyons.

The new monument will contain soldiers defending the Union and the flag. The sculptor Gary Castell



Civil War Research

The 111th NY Volunteer Regiment research team is hard at work pulling together a vast history of the men from Wayne and Cayuga Counties who served from 1862 to 1865 in the War of the Rebellion, aka the Civil War. Principal team members include Jim Paprocki, Marjory Perez, George McGraw, Steve Sklenar, Harold Cheetam, Rosa Fox and Linda Stevenson.

The team is busy scouring the internet on Ancestry.com, FaceBook and other research sites to create a database containing in-depth information about these 1,928 men who served in the 111th. Eventually the database will be an online tool for people to learn more about each of the soldier's service record, post war life and death. There will be links to FindaGrave.com, Facebook posts, newspaper articles and photos. In a future WCHS newsletter, we will announce access to the soldiers and articles database online.

Currently the team is on the hunt for the Medal of Honor awarded to Corporal Franklin W. Lutes of Wolcott for singlehandedly capturing the 41st Alabama Regimental Flag and two Confederate color-bearers on March 31, 1865. The trail has lead from Wolcott to Missoula, Montana where it was last seen in 1994. The team has also been using this information to write a series of 24 articles that have appeared on





the History page of the Times of Wayne County newspaper over the last six months. If you have a relative that served in the 111th or any NY regiment during the Civil War please contact

A MEDAL OF HONOR and a Civil War discharge are two of the most cherished possessions of a Williamson resident, A. M. Lutes. The Medal of Honor was granted his father, Cpl. Franklin Lutes, for gallantry in action during the Civil War.

Corporal Lutes captured the enemy's colors, the color bearer and half the color guard while fighting with the 111th New York Volunteers. For this he was granted a furlough from the field to go to Washington, D. C., and present the captured colors to President Lincoln, after which he was allowed to return to his home. However, word arrived almost immediately that Lincoln had been shot and he returned to the battlefield before his furlough was over.

When the war was ended not enough of his company were left alive to be mustered out as a unit, so that Corporal Lutes was mustered out with the 91st Albany Infantry, his son relates.

This Medal of Honor, only a comparative few of which were granted during the Civil War, and the Corporal's discharge are today treasured by the hero's son, who resides at 54 W. Main St. in Williamson.
